Season Review

Moth numbers have generally been down this year. However, there have been three new county records; A Webb's Wainscot came to light at Grafham Water on July 30th (Barry Dickerson & Marion Palmann.) On August 21st Nick Greatorex-Davies recorded a Nephopterix augustella in his garden at Hemingford Grey, as well as the pyralid Sciota adelphella on July 5th. Other moths of interest include the Gem at Little Paxton (lan Dawson) on August 17th, and two Square-Spotted Clays at Hazelcroft, Gamlingay Wood on the same date. There have been several reports of Hummingbird Hawkmoths in the county, whilst in Biggleswade, Beds, an albino Large Yellow Underwing was caught by Richard Revels in his garden trap

Butterflies have also had a very poor year, with the exception of the Holly Blue, which appears to be on the "up" stage of its cycle. In Brampton Wood on August 28th many hundreds of Green Veined Whites were seen, mainly on scabious

along the length of the main ride.

National Moth Night

Despite a brisk wind the trapping at Paxton Pits was fairly successful, though the White Spotted Pinion was not recorded. It was recorded at a new site in Hilton, as well as at Dry Drayton, Cambridgeshire, where ten specimens were counted. A few night afterwards, David Evans ran two lights in a wood near Abbot's Ripton, and recorded two, as well as about 40 hornets, many of whom hitched a ride home with him in the back of his truck.

2002's event will be on 15th June, when it is hoped to trap Woodwalton Fen and possibly Ramsey Heights Clay Pits, with the target moth being the Concolorous.

*** Large Blue ***

The trip took place on July 17th, and despite good weather and map references to promising sites, no Large Blues were seen. They were apparently present only in low numbers at the second site we visited. Admission to the main site where the introduction took place is limited, and by appointment only, but it is hoped to arrange this in the future. However, 2002 is already fully booked.
