Early Butterflies

Believe it or not, the spring and early summer of 1999 has been warmer and drier than for several years, and this has led to some early emergences, including:

- Meadow Browns from 2nd week June.
- A Ringlet at Grafham Water on 15th June.
- A White Admiral at Brampton Wood 18th
- A Gatekeeper on St. Neots Golf Course on 24th June.

Other notable sitings:

- · 2 Wall Butterflies by the railway at New England Bridge in May. and two others near Bluntisham around the same time.
- A Grizzled Skipper on the verge near the railway at Abbots Ripton Bridge on May 3rd.
- · A Wood White at Brampton Wood on June 18th. This was probably a release, as there are very few recent records for this species in the county.
- · The Black Hairstreak has also been early, the first being seen in Monks Wood in mid June, although one was seen in Brampton Wood as recently as July 2nd.

New Moth Records

- · A number of notable moth records have been reported in the county this year:
- A Buttoned Snout at Hemingford Grey on April 23rd, and another on May 9th.
- · Several Small Elephant Hawkmoths on 13th June and 1st July at Hemingford Grey, and another near Ramsey on 10th
- A Blossom Underwing on 31st March at Hemingford Grey, the first since the VCR. Others have been seen in the country, including one each in Norfolk & Suffolk.
- A Scarce Green Silver Lines and an Orange Footman, also at Hemingford Grey in July.

The Marbled White

This butterfly seems still to be increasing in numbers, and spreading around Huntingdonshire. The colony near St. Neots railway station is still going strong, with the first one seen on June 25th, with several others since. Additionally, a single specimen was sighted at Little Paxton Pits on June 26th, the second successive year one has been seen there. Two further sites this year are Grafham Water, and St. Neots golf course, where one was spotted perched on a golf ball. Both these records are for July 2nd.
